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## **First Generation**

**1. HENRY<sup>1</sup> TURNER.** According to an old Bible belonging to the Bellenfant<sup>[1]</sup> family, "Henry Turner of Culpepper Va. came to Caswell Co. N.C. 1753. His sons were James, George, Henry, John & William."<sup>[2]</sup> He married<sup>[3]</sup> NANCY/ANNE KIMBROUGH, daughter of Thomas and Eleanor (Graves) Kimbrough.

In 1764 Thomas and Eleanor Kimbrough moved to Caswell Co. (the part that later became Orange Co. in 1777) from Spotsylvania Co., Va., which abuts Culpeper Co., Va.<sup>[4]</sup> Thomas Kimbrough's will, proved 1777 in Caswell Co., states, "I give to my Daughter Nanney Turner one Negroe boy Sam and Ten pounds proclamation Money, to her Heirs and Assigns forever."<sup>[5]</sup>

Henry Turner signed his will 9 May 1807 in Caswell Co., N.C., and it was proved in the Dec. Court 1809 there. In it are mentioned, in order, his wife, Anne Turner, his sons, John, Henry, "Billey," and Thomas Turner, his daughters, "Elizabeth Lipscomb, Frankey Martin, Milley Jones, and Nancy Kimbrough," "Salley" French, and Mary Cochran, his grand-

From National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) records, as reported to the author by Dr. Mary Jo Hall, email 12 Sept. 2002. These same records have son James moving to Caswell Co. at about age 18, or about 1773–1774, so perhaps the 1753 date above should be 1773.
 *Captain Thomas Graves*, 1608 Settler of Jamestown, Virginia, revised 11 Mar. 2002, cites the will of

Thomas Kimbrough in Caswell (later Orange) Co., N.C., Wills, A:25, proved 1777; My Southern Family, <freepages.genealogy.rootsweb.com/~mysouthernfamily> has Eleanor<sup>6</sup> (*Thomas*<sup>5</sup>, *Jeffrey*<sup>4</sup>, *Jeffrey*<sup>3</sup>, *Thomas*<sup>2</sup>, *Thomas*<sup>1</sup>) a descendant of Capt. Graves of Jamestown.

son, "Yancey" Turner, his granddaughters, Mary "Frency," and "Fanney Turner, Delila Turner, and Nancy Turner, daughters of John Turner," and his son, James Turner. Executors were sons James and Thomas Turner. Witnesses were William S. Webb, and M. Kimbrough. (See appendix A.)

Children, in the order presented in the Bellenfant Bible, followed by the order presented in Henry's will:

- + 2 i JAMES<sup>2</sup> TURNER, born 9 Oct. 1756, Culpeper Co., Va., married (1) LUCY PLEASANT, and had several children, then married (2) CATHERINE S./L. WHITE. James was mentioned last in Henry's 1807 will. This is Turner Whitted's line.
  - 3 ii GEORGE<sup>2</sup> TURNER. George was not mentioned in Henry's 1807 will.
  - 4 iii HENRY<sup>2</sup> TURNER. Henry and John are listed in reverse order in Henry Sr.'s 1807 will.
  - 5 iv JOHN<sup>2</sup> TURNER. Nancy (Kimbrough) Turner's brother, John Kimbrough, Sr., had a daughter, Sarah Kimbrough, who married a John Turner, 14 Feb. 1787, Caswell Co., N.C., who might have been John<sup>2,[6]</sup> John had three daughters mentioned in Henry's 1807 will: (1) Fanney<sup>3</sup> Turner; (2) Delila<sup>3</sup> Turner; and (3) Nancy<sup>3</sup> Turner.
  - 6 v WILLIAM<sup>2</sup> TURNER.
  - 7 vi THOMAS<sup>2</sup> TURNER.
  - 8 vii ELIZABETH<sup>2</sup> TURNER, married LIPSCOMB.
  - 9 viii FRANKEY<sup>2</sup> TURNER, married MARTIN.
  - 10 ix MILLEY<sup>2</sup> TURNER, married JONES.
  - 11 x NANCY<sup>2</sup> TURNER, married KIMBROUGH.
  - 12 xi SARAH<sup>2</sup> TURNER, married FRENCH, and had at least one child:
    (1) Mary<sup>3</sup> French, mentioned in Henry's 1807 will.

**2. JAMES**<sup>2</sup> **TURNER** (<sub>1</sub>*Henry*<sup>1</sup>) was born 9 Oct. 1756, Culpeper Co., Va.,<sup>[7]</sup> died 21 May 1835, age 78, Williamson Co., Tenn.<sup>[8]</sup> He moved to Caswell Co., probably County Line Creek, N.C., in about 1773 when he was about 18. He married (1) 5 Aug. 1793, Caswell Co., N.C.,<sup>[9]</sup> **LUCY PLEASANT**. He moved to Tennessee in 1808,<sup>[10]</sup> and married (2) 2 Sept. 1811, Williamson Co., Tenn.,<sup>[11]</sup> **CATHERINE S./L. WHITE**.

In the Revolutionary War, Pvt. James Turner was at the Battle of Camden, South Carolina, 17 Aug. 1780, and the Battle of Guilford Court House, Greensboro, N.C., 15 Mar. 1781, shortly before the Battle of Yorktown, Sept.–Oct. 1781.<sup>[12]</sup> He was wounded.<sup>[13]</sup> This is his biography from his pension application affidavit, 24 Aug. 1832, Williamson Co., Tenn.:

He entered the service of the United States about April 1776 as a volunteer under the following officers—Captain George Samuel (rest of company officers not recollected) commanded by Col. William Moore and attached to the Brigade commanded by General Butler and marched over the following country from Caswell Court House he marched to Hillsboro North Carolina—to Cross Creek and to a small [river? "town" crossed out]

named Camden N.C. and was there discharged about two months after he entered the service say in June following—was in no engagements or battles nor received any discharge.

Entered the service a second time as a substitute for a person whose name he has forgotten about July 1776 under Captain Falker commanded by Col. William Moore attached to General Butlers Brigade he marched towards Halston[?] River to attack the Indians but heard that they were defeated and returned home and was discharged in September same year received a discharge but destroyed it [words off bottom of page] no value.

Entered the service a third time on the 29 day of May 1780 as a drafted militia man under the following officers Captain Robert Parks Lieutenant George Oldham and Ensign John Oldham commanded by Col. Stephen Moore Major Belfield attached to General Butlers Brigade marched from Caswell Courthouse N. C. to Hillsborough—to Chauraw Hills [probably Cheraw Hill, now Cheraw, South Carolina] to Rugeley's Mills [South Carolina] and marched again for Camden South Carolina and met the British army commanded by Lord Cornwallis at which time he was defeated together with General Gates army & returned home and immediately returned to the army again and was marched to Salisbury in North Carolina and there discharged some time in December 1780. Was only in the battle of Gates defeat received no discharge he recollects that he served with and under the following officers at Gates defeat General Gates Col. Richardson of Virginia Regulars Col. Dickson and Major Sharpe.

Entered the service a fourth time some time in the year 1781 as a volunter[sic] under Col. William Moore and served about one month during which time he was at the battle of Guilford the other particulars relative to this campaign he does not recollect. he received no discharge.

Entered the service a fifth time as a volunteer in the fall of the year 1781 under Captain John Douglass—commanded by Col. William Oneal to Harrass and keep down the Tories and was absent about two months during which time he was in no engagements except that with Col. Tanner[?] of the Tories which as well as he now recollects was during this campaign. He received no discharge for any of the above services except on two months tour which he disposed of as aforesaid.

He was born on the 9<sup>th</sup> day of October 1756 in Culpepker[sic] County Virginia when he entered the service of the United States at the several times above specified he resided in the County of Caswell in North Carolina.

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After the revolution he lived in the aforesaid County of Caswell until the year one thousand eight hundred and eight at which time he moved to Tennessee and has resided in Williamson County aforesaid.<sup>[14]</sup>

There is a plaque in the Williamson Co. Courthouse, Franklin, Tenn., with the name of James Turner on it for his service to America's freedom.<sup>[15]</sup>

James Turner signed his will on 13 May 1831 in Williamson Co., Tenn., and it was proved in the Oct. Term 1835 there. In it are mentioned, in order, his wife, Catherine L. Turner, his son, Josiah Turner, his son-in-law, "William S. Webb, the husband of my deceased daughter, Mildred," his daughters, Polly Nolen, Sarah "Bellyfont," Frances Hunt, Lucinda Jordan, his son, James Turner, his daughter, Nancy Vaughn, his son, William Turner, his son-in-law, Richard Vaughn, and the children of his daughter, Nancy Vaughn. His friends, John Jordan and William S. Webb, were appointed executors. Witnesses were E. Breathill(?), Jeremiah Field, and Peter N. Smith. John Hughes and Nicholas Perkins supplied sureties for the bond of the executors.

**15. JOSIAH**<sup>3</sup> **TURNER SR.** (*James*<sup>2</sup>, *Henry*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1780 on Country Line Creek, Caswell Co., N.C.,<sup>[17]</sup> son of James Turner,<sup>[18]</sup> and died 15 Oct. 1874, Mebaneville, Orange Co., N.C.,<sup>[19]</sup> He married June 1810<sup>[20]</sup> **ELIZA ESTES EVANS**, who was born 18 Jan. 1790,<sup>[21]</sup> North Carolina, daughter of Theophilus and Susan Carver (Grove) Evans. Josiah came to Orange Co., N.C., as a young man. He lived in Hillsborough (often Hillsboro) the last few years of his life with his daughter, Mrs. James Mebane.<sup>[22]</sup> He was Sheriff of Orange Co. 1810–1818.<sup>[23]</sup> Eliza was alive at the 1860 census of Orange Co.

Theophilus Evans, born 18 Nov. 1746, North Carolina, son of Jonathan and Mary Evans, died 1822, North Carolina, married Susan Grove, daughter of Barry Grove, in Dec. 1773.<sup>[25]</sup> Theophilus is famous as one of the 69 local patriots who, more than a year before the Declaration of Independence was signed in Philadelphia, signed June 1775 "The Cumberland Association," later called the "Liberty Point Resolves." In that document, they proclaimed their willingness to fight for the independence of the State of North Carolina and resolved to "go forth and be ready to sacrifice our lives and fortunes to secure her freedom and safety." A monument to the Liberty Point Resolves stands at the intersection of Person and Bow Streets in downtown Fayetteville, North Carolina, near the Cumberland County Court House. The title line on its plaque

reads, "Declaration of Independence–June 20, 1775." The top name in the center column of names is "Theophilus Evans."<sup>[26]</sup>

Theopilis Evans was a soldier in the North Carolina militia in the Revolutionary War, from the Wilmington District.<sup>[27]</sup>

Susan Carver (Grove) Evans was a daughter<sup>[28]</sup> of the Hon. William Barry Grove, born 15 Jan. 1764, Fayetteville, Cumberland Co., N.C., died 30 Mar. 1818, Fayetteville, and buried in Grove Creek Cemetery. He was a member of the North Carolina House of Commons in 1786, 1788, and 1789. He was a delegate to the 1788 convention called to consider ratification of the Constitution of the United States, and also to the 1789 convention when it was finally ratified. He was elected as a Representative from North Carolina to the Second through the Seventh Congresses, 4 Mar. 1791 to 3 Mar. 1803.<sup>[29]</sup> He married 10 Aug. 1801, Orange Co., N.C., Sarah Sheppard.<sup>[30]</sup>

In 1850 Josiah Turner "Sen<sup>r</sup>," 68, a farmer born in North Carolina with \$25,000 in real estate, resided in Orange Co., N.C., with Eliza, 58, born in North Carolina, and with the following, all born in North Carolina: Thomas, 25, a physician, Josiah Jr., 28, a lawyer, Mary, 21, and Julian, 15, a student.<sup>[31]</sup>

In 1860 Josiah Turner Sr., 78, resided Hillsboro, Orange Co., N.C., a farmer born in North Carolina, with the following, all surnamed Turner and all natives of North Carolina: Eliza E., 69, Lydia, 32, John, 42, James, 34, Evans, 32, Julius, 25, Mary J., 12, deaf and dumb, George, 10, William A., 8, and Theodore, 5.<sup>[32]</sup> The four young children were son John's, as proved below. Lydia might have been wife to one of the sons. Son Evans was not listed in the Bellenfant Bible. This James would have been born about 1826, which doesn't fit the James of the Bellenfant Bible listed below.

In 1870 Josiah Turner Sr., 89, resided with Evans, 44, in Little River Twp., Orange Co., N.C.<sup>[33]</sup> Also in the household was William Turner, 38, probably Josiah's son, as was Evans.

The Orange Co. will of Elizabeth Estes is dated 26 Oct. 1841, proved "May Court 1845," mentions: niece Catherine Evans who is left the "house on Churton Street," Hillsborough; friend Mrs. Josiah Turner; Eliza Turner and Mary Turner, daughters of Josiah Turner; Mrs. Susan Mebane, wife of James Mebane, Jr. A codicil dated 18 Nov. 1843 mentions niece Catherine Evans, who is now the wife of John Turner.<sup>[34]</sup>

All were born in North Carolina.<sup>[40]</sup>

In 1850 General L. Nolen, 65[?], and Mary, 55[?], resided in Williamson Co., Tenn. in 1850. General is a farmer born in Virginia with real estate valued at \$2,296, and Mary was a native of North Carolina. With them were Julius [Jatur?], 26, a farmer, Eliza R., 34, John B., 22, a farmer, Patrick, 16, a farmer, Katherine, 13, and William Crown 33, a farmer. All but General and Mary were born in Tennessee.<sup>[51]</sup>

JOHN**<sup>4</sup> **TURNER** (<sup>15</sup>*Josiah*<sup>3</sup>, *James*<sup>2</sup>, *Henry*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1818, North Carolina, died 16 Mar. 1890, Orange Co., N.C., married 11 May 1843 (bond date), Cumberland Co., N.C., <sup>[54]</sup> **CATHERINE EVANS**, born about 1822, North Carolina, probably died before the 1860 census.

In 1850 John Turner, 32, resided in Orange Co., N.C., a farmer native to North Carolina. With him are Cathrin, 28, Mary, 4, deaf and dumb, and George, 1.<sup>[55]</sup>

As already shown, John 42 was living with his father Josiah Turner, Sr. in 1860 in Hillsborough, Orange Co., N.C., and so were Mary J. 12, deaf and dumb, George 10, William A. 8, and Theodore 5.<sup>[56]</sup> Therefore the four children are John's children. Presumably, his wife Catherine died before the 1860 census.

In 1870 John Turner, 50, a farmer born in North Carolina with \$1,000 real and \$300 personal estates, rsided in Little River Twp., Orange Co., with "Julus," 38, perhaps his brother, and with his son, "Theadore," 16, and also with three females: Sally Phillips 40, Nannie Phillips 8, and Patsie Brown 42, all born in North Carolina.<sup>[57]</sup> Julus is probably John's brother Julian [Julius]. but if so, then his age is off by about 10 years relative other records. Nearby are John's brothers, Evans and William, in one household, and Thomas H., probably his brother, in another.

In 1880 John Turner, 70, resided in the household of his son, Theodore Turner, 27, in Durham Twp., Orange Co., N.C. [q.v.]. His son, George, 30, also resided there. James Turner, 65, resided next door.<sup>[58]</sup>

He married 16 Apr. 1863, South Lowell, Durham (now Orange) Co., N.C.,<sup>[65]</sup> MARY HANNAH MCMANNEN, who was born about 1839, South Lowell,<sup>[66]</sup> daughter of Rev. 


Figure 5. Josiah Turner Jr., editor of the Raleigh Sentinal<sup>[75]</sup>

**26. JOSIAH**<sup>4</sup> **TURNER JR.** (15*Josiah*<sup>3</sup>, *James*<sup>2</sup>, *Henry*<sup>1</sup>) was born 27 Dec. 1821, Hillsborough, Orange Co., N.C., <sup>[76]</sup> died 26 Oct. 1901, near Hillsborough, buried at St. Matthew's Episcopal Churchyard there. <sup>[77]</sup> He mar-

ried 24 Jan. 1856, Halifax Co., N.C.,<sup>[78]</sup> **SOPHIA CHESTER DEVEREAUX**, daughter of Thomas Devereaux.

Josiah was licensed to practice law in 1845. He was a member North Carolina's general assembly, 1852, 1854, 1856, 1858, 1860, and 1868.<sup>[79]</sup> He was a delegate to the North Carolina secession convention, 1861.<sup>[80]</sup>

Capt. Josiah Turner, Jr. commanded Company K of the 19<sup>th</sup> North Carolina Troops in the Confederate Army during the Civil War, starting from the first assembly of the regiment in Aug.-Sept. 1861. His first lieutenant was William A. Graham, Jr. The regiment took part in the battle of New Bern, Craven Co., N.C., 14 Mar. 1862. In an engagement with the enemy at Gillet's, in Onslow Co., on 14 Apr. 1862, "Captain Turner of Company K was severely wounded and disabled for futher service in the field." A regimental roster of 1 June 1863 does not mention Josiah, and Company K is commanded by Capt. W. A. Graham, Jr.<sup>[81]</sup>

He was a Representative from North Carolina in the Confederate Congress, 1864-5, where he served on the committees for foreign affairs and Indian affairs.<sup>[82]</sup> In 1866 he was in Washington D. C., seeking to be seated as a U. S. Representative.

Those chosen as Representatives in Congress at the November election [1865] were ... Josiah Turner ... but Congress adopted a resolution that no member should be admitted from any insurrectionary state until Congress had declared the state entitled to representation ... they were not admitted.<sup>[83]</sup>

He was a delegate to the North Carolina state constitutional convention, 1875.<sup>[84]</sup>

He was and remains a controversial figure. The following captures the flavor of this controversy:

During the post-Civil War Reconstruction era, bitter recriminations exchanged by rival Raleigh newspapers fueled the so-called Kirk-Holden War. Josiah Turner's *Sentinel* fiercely opposed the policies of Republican governor William W. Holden and accused his administration of despotism and corruption. The *North Carolina Standard*, formerly published by Holden, defended him and accused Turner's Democratic supporters of lawlessness and of having ties to the Ku Klux Klan.

The rivalry played out during the election season of 1870 in the form of violence, widespread arrests, and martial law. The Republicans lost the election of 1870, which enabled the new Democratic General Assembly to impeach Holden and remove him from office. Ironically, without each other as foils, both newspapers failed.<sup>[85]</sup>

In 1860, Josiah Turner, Jr. 37, a farmer and lawyer born in North Carolina, with \$5,000 in real estate value, resides in Orange Co., N.C., with Sophia C. 25, Thomas 3, and Charles 1, all born in North Carolina.<sup>[86]</sup>

Josiah Turner 79, a widower born Jan. 1821 in North Carolina, resides in 1900 in North Hillsboro Township, Orange Co., with his brother Julian S. 72. Their father was born in Virginia, which is inconsistent with other sources, and their mother in North Carolina. The birthdate of Jan. 1821 is also slightly inconsistent with other sources.<sup>[87]</sup>




Figure 7. Relationship between Alvy Ray Smith and Turner Whitted

### A: 1807 Will of Henry Turner

Caswell Co., North Carolina Wills – May 9, 1807; probated Dec. Court 1809

In the name of God Amen – I, HENRY TURNER of Caswell County, State of North Carolina, being very infirm in body, but sound in mind and memory, do make and Ordain this my last Will and Testament.

I give and recomment [*sic*] my Soul unto the hands of Almighty God and my body to the ground to be buried after Christian like burial – After all my Just Debts are paid I give to my beloved wife, ANNE TURNER, the tract of land inclosing the plantation whereon I now live, together with half the interest of the Mill, and all the household and kitchen furniture with the plantation tools of every kind; also the negroes, to Wit: Sam, Winney and Abram, two good horses, four Cows & Calves or with calf, four ewes and lambs, four sows and pigs, and a sufficient quantity of Corn and Meat or provisions for to support her &. her family and Stock for the term of one year after my decease;

Also I give to my beloved wife my Cart and Steers; all which I give her during her natural life or Widowhood;

and after her death or marriage, it is my will and desire that the wholeof my perishable property not specially devised to any of my children, or Grand Children, should be sold according to Law, and the money arising there from to be equally divided amongst my heirs, Excepting sons JOHN TURNER and HENRY TURNER –

Item – I give end bequeath to my son BILLEY TURNER, one hundred and sixtyacres of land. It being the tract of land on which I now live, and including the tract which I gave to my son HENRY TURNER from which he purchased the same together with helf [*sic*] the Interest of the Mill aforesaid, but not to intermiddle(?) with the Mill or plantation on the South side of the Creek (tite ?) after the death of my beloved wife ANNE TURNER; also Eight pounds Virginia Currency to be drawn out of my perishable estate, to her Heirs and Assigns forever –

Item – I give and bequeath to my beloved son THOMAS TURNER, Eight pounds Virginia money to be drawn out of my perishable estate to him and his heirs and assigns forever – Item – I give and bequeath to my beloved daughters ELIZABETH LIPSCOMB, FRANKEY MARTIN, MILLEY JONES, and NANCY KIMBROUGH, Sixteen pounds Virginia Currency to be raised out of my perishable estate to them and their heirs forever –

Item – U guve [*sic*] and bequeath to my beloved daughter SALLEY FRENCH sixteen pounds Virginia Currency to her, her heirs and assigns forever –

Item – I give and bequeath to my daughter MARY COCHRAN Twenty-four pounds Virginia Currency to her and her Heirs forever –

Item – I give and bequeath to my Grandson YANCEY TURNER, eight pounds Virginia Currency to him and his Heirs forever –

Item – I give and bequeath to my Grand Daughter MARY FRENCY, eight pounds Virginia Currency to be drawn out of perishable estate –

Item – I give and bequeath to my Grand Daughters FANNEY TURNER, DELILA TURNER and NANCY TURNER, daughters of <u>JOHN TURNER</u>, the sum of Eight pounds Virginia money equally to be divided between them, to be drawn out of my perishable estate –

Item – It is my will that my property which I have not herein divided shall be sold after my decease, by my Executors, to the highest bidder, and also at the death or marriage of my wife, the perishable property which I have devised to her should be sold, and after the several legacies are discharged which I have devised in money, it is my will that the Overplus, should be equally divided among my following children, to Wit:

JAMES TURNER, THOMAS TURNER & BILLEY TURNER, ELIZABETH LIPSCOMB, FRANKEY MARTIN, MILLEY JONES, SU-SANNAH DONOHO, SALLEY FRENCH, MARY COCHRAN, NANCY KIMBROUGH, and my Grand daughters: FANNEY, DELI-LAH and NANCEY TURNER, daughters of JOHN TURNER, which is to be drawn one share between them

Item – It is my Will and desire that my son JAMES TURNER in consequence of a purchase made by him from my son HENRY TURNER by my knowledge and consent, that the said JAMES should draw two shares in stead of one for his part –

Lastly – I constitute and appoint my sons JAMES TURNER and THOMAS TURNER, sole executors of this my last Will and Testament,

revoking all other Wills heretofore by me made. Only confirming this to be my last Will and Testament. In Testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my Seal this 9th day of May, A. Dom. 1807.

## **B:** The Jean Bellenfant Family

#### **First Generation**

**1. JEAN [JOHN]<sup>1</sup> BELLENFANT**, said to have been born in France about 1750,<sup>[146]</sup> came to America and is said to have fought in the Revolution, and died after 26 Oct. 1798 (when John Bellenfant sold land (q.v.)) and before 24 May 1802 (when a court order mentions an apprenticeship and a guardianship, respectively, for two of John's children, presumably after his death). John first settled in Virginia. His son Joseph<sup>2</sup> was born 14 Nov. 1790 in Halifax Co., Va., which was probably the family's location in Virginia.

He married (1) perhaps 1784/5 LOUISA [LUCY] YEOMAN[S]  $(_1Drury^1)$ , of Virginia, daughter of Drury Yeoman[s]. She might have died about 23 Aug. 1797, when a daughter was named "Mourning." Both John and Louisa were clearly dead before May 1808 when slaves were apportioned to the "Legatees of Drury Yeomans (Orphans of John Bellanfant)" (see court order below), and also probably before 24 May 1802 (by previously mentioned court order). *This is my line.* See appendix C, The Drury Yeoman Family.

John married (2) presumably after 23 Aug. 1797 (perhaps Lucy's death) and perhaps before 24 May 1802 (when John's children, apparently orphans, appear in court implying his death), and before 23 May 1806 (when Sally Bellenfant appears in James Ray's will SALLY RAY,

who was born about 1778 (82 in 1850 census, q.v), North Carolina, daughter of James and Betsy (–) Ray. She signed her will 20 May 1860, Rockingham Co., N.C., and it was proved Feb. 1861.<sup>[147]</sup> This marriage is deduced from the will of James Ray, written 23 May 1806, proved November 1806, in Rockingham Co., N.C., which mentions "my beloved wife Betsy Ray," "my three daughters, Sally Bellenfant, Jinny Ray, and Ursley Ray," and "my three sons, Parram Ray, Pleasant Ray & Payton Ray."<sup>[148]</sup> See appendix D, The James Ray Family.

John Bellenfant, French soldier, was said to have come to this country with Marquis de LaFayette in 1777 and served in the American Revolution with him.<sup>[149]</sup> One story is that John was a sailor on the ship that brought LaFayette to America and perhaps served in the Navy during the war. (So far, none of the colaborators in this project have discovered any "official" record of his service - only references in county histories, in the Bellenfant Bible, and by family tradition.) After the war was over, John (or Jean) decided to stay in America and settled in Virginia - some have said in Petersburg, others have said Fairfax County. Soon after the war, perhaps 1784/5, he was married to Louisa (Lucy) Yeomans (or Emmons) of Virginia, presumably the daughter of Drewry (Drury) Yeomans, Sr. as her seven children shared, as legatees, in his estate. (Court Minutes, Rockingham Co., N.C., Nov. Term, 1804, p. 25;<sup>[150]</sup> May Term, 1805, p. 57,<sup>[151]</sup> 60;<sup>[152]</sup> also from papers in John Bellenfant estate file at N.C. State Archives, Raleigh, N.C. in the Rockingham Co. estate files arranged alphabetically.)<sup>[153]</sup>

The twins were said to have been born in Fairfax Co., Va. At least two children were born in Halifax Co., Va. where John had bought 118 acres

of land on 16 Aug 1787 (Deed book 14, p. 160).<sup>[154]</sup> Another tract was bought in Halifax Co. when sold for taxes there, recorded 18 [should be 28] April 1788.<sup>[155]</sup> In 1792 John bought 310 acres of land in Rockingham Co. N.C., and he may have moved there soon after this transaction. (Deed Book C, p. 147, Feb. 15, 1792).<sup>[156]</sup> Deed book E, p. 332 showed record of sale of this property 26 Oct 1798.<sup>[157]</sup> There is a story that Louisa had been on a visit with her husband's people in Marseille, France [we know nothing of this!] and was on board ship on route home again when she died in giving birth to a daughter. The child, born 23 Aug 1797, was named "Mourning" because of this incident. Louisa was buried at sea.

There was a Sarah "Sally" (Ray) Bellerphant whose name appeared in Rockingham Co Will Abstracts – (1785–1865) – for 1805, 1846, and 1860, dau. of James Ray.<sup>[158]</sup> There is a question as to whether she may have been a second wife of John Bellenfant. No identification for her have we found.

John Bellenfant died before May, 1802, since Rockingham Co, N.C. Court Minutes at that time, p 251–262, recorded guardians appointed for his minor orphans.<sup>[159]</sup> Concerning John's death, there is a story that a

store in Petersburg, Va., which he owned (?) and operated, caught fire and that he died as a result of injuries in fighting the fire. However, since he had resided in Rockingham Co., N.C. during the 1790's and since guardians were appointed for his orphan children in Rockingham Co., it is reasonable to think he died in that county. Another story was that John had worked at foundry in Rockingham Co. where there was a fire and that he died as result of fighting the fire.

On 10 Feb. 1791 John Bellenfant of Halifax Co., Va., sold to Daniel Roberts of Halifax Co., for 6,000 lbs. of tobacco and £50 of Virginia money, 118 acres in Halifax Co. on Difficult Creek. The deal was acknowledged 28 Feb. 1791 in Halifax Co. Court February Term 1791.<sup>[160]</sup>

On 17 Dec. 1791 a commission of four was appointed by Halifax Co. Court, as reported during January Term 1792, and ordered to obtain the uncoerced acknowledgement of the above deed from Lucy Bellenfant, wife of John. They did so on 17 Dec. 1791 and reported that Lucy "Bellenafant" "freely and Voluntarily relinquished her right of dower to" the 118 acres. On 23 Jan. 1792 the completion of the order was recorded.<sup>[161]</sup>

On 15 Feb. 1792 John Bellenfant bought 310 acres "on River bank" in Rockingham Co., N.C., adjacent James Ray (and others) for £120 from William Johnson and his wife Sarah.<sup>[162]</sup> The Johnsons were proba-

was born 1784–1794. She married (2) 18 Dec. 1837, Warren Co., Ga.,<sup>[188]</sup> JOHN SHIELDS.

In 1810 "Calib Helmon," 16–26, resided in Greensboro, Guilford Co., N.C., with a woman 16–26 [born 1784–1794], three boys and one girl under 10.<sup>[189]</sup> Four children are inconsistent with an 1809 marriage, so probably Caleb had been previously married.

In 1820 Caleb "Hilmon," 26-45, resided in Greensboro, Guilford Co., N.C., with a woman 26-45 [born 1775-1794], two males over 45, two boys and two girls under 10, and one slave.<sup>[190]</sup>

In 1832 Caleb Hillman of Parham's, Warren Co., Ga., won Cherokee land in a lottery, parcel 56 in Union Co., Ga.<sup>[191]</sup>

In 1830 Caleb "Hillmon," 40–50, resided in Warren Co., Ga., with a woman 30–40 [born 1790–1800], one male 70–80, two boys under 5, one girl 5–10, one male and one female 10–15, one male and one female 15–20, and one slave.<sup>[192]</sup>

In 1870 Lucy Shields, 76, born in Georgia [*sic*], resided in Warrenton, Warren Co., Ga., in the household of Josephus Hillman, 44 [born about 1826], a farmer and minister born in Georgia with \$12,800 real and \$3,000 personal estates, and with Martha A., 32, born in Georgia, and with Arther E., 20, Andrew L., 19, Willis J., 17, Alex N. S., 12, Martha A. F., 11, and "Cha<sup>s</sup>," 11, all born in Georgia.<sup>[193]</sup>

In 1880 Lucy Hillman, 87 [born about 1793], a widow born in Georgia [*sic*, inconsistent with the Georgia nativity of Joseph Hillman's mother] of Georgia natives, resided in Taliafero Co., Ga., in the household of her son, "Joseph" Hillman, 53 [born about 1827], a farmer born in Georgia of a father born in Georgia and a mother in Virginia, with his

In 1860 Josephus Hillman, 33, a farmer born in Georgia with \$11,650 real and \$15,000 personal estates, resided in Warrenton, Williams Dist., Warren Co., Ga., with Martha, 27, Aletha, 9, Andrew, 7, Willis, 5, Alexander, 3, and Martha, 1, all born in Georgia, and with (his cousin) F[ranklin] L.<sup>3</sup> Winn ( $_{4}Susannah^{2}$ , *Jean*<sup>1</sup>), 28, a farm laborer born in Tennessee with \$300 personal estate.<sup>[196]</sup> Franklin L. ["SALLY"]<sup>3</sup> TURNER (*James*<sup>2</sup>, *Henry*<sup>1</sup> *Turner*), who was born 7 Aug. 1801, Caswell Co., N.C.,<sup>[200]</sup> died 10 Apr. 1876, age 75,<sup>[201]</sup> and was buried near her husband.<sup>[202]</sup>

Soon after Joseph's birth, the Bellenfant family moved to Rockingham Co., N.C., a distance of 80–90 miles, according to a deed there dated 15 Feb. 1792.<sup>[203]</sup> Joseph and Sally moved to Maury Co. in 1824 (see quote below).

The Bellenfant tradition has it that Joseph's father, Jean Bellenfant, came to America with Lafayette and fought with him in the Revolutionary War. An unpublished Bellenfant genealogy gives the details and expresses a caveat:

John Bellenfant, French soldier, was said to have come to this country with Marquis de LaFayette in 1777 and served in the American Revolution with him. One story is that John was a sailor on the ship that brought LaFayette to America and perhaps served in the Navy during the war. (So far, none of the colaborators in this project have discovered any "official" record of his service—only references in county histories, in the Bellenfant Bible, and by family tradition.) After the war was over, John (or Jean) decided to stay in America and settled in Virginia—some have said in Petersburg, others have said Fairfax County. Soon after the war, perhaps 1784/5, he was married to Louisa (Lucy) Yeomans (or Emmons) of Virginia, presumably the daughter of Drewry (Drury) Yeomans, Sr. as her seven children shared, as legatees, in his estate. (Court Minutes, Rockingham Co., N.C., Nov. Term, 1804, p. 25; May term, 1805, p. 57,

60; also from papers in John Bellenfant estate file at N.C. State Archives, Raleigh, N.C. in the Rockingham Co. estate files arranged alphabetical-ly.)<sup>[204]</sup>

The same **unvetted** source has this to say about Joseph Ballanfant, and notes the spelling change:

Joseph Ballanfant was born 14 Nov 1790 in Halifax Co., Va., d. 9 Nov 1869. When he was very young, his family moved to Rockingham Co., N.C. where he grew up. In the May 1802 Term of Court in Rockingham Co., "Joseph Betoffen, age 12 was bound out to Z. Strong". He served in the War of 1812 for six months, beginning 28 Nov 1814. He went to Williamson Co. Tn., probably soon after this war service, where he farmed a few years, then, according to "Century Review of Maury Co., Tenn., 1807-1907" p. 112, he moved, in 1824, to Maury Co. where he lived until his death. He was one of the ones in his family who made a change in the spelling of the surname. He was m. 22 Apr 1819 in Williamson Co. to Sally Turner, b. 7 Aug 1801, Caswell Co., N.C., d. 18 Apr 1876. Sally was the fifth dau of James Turner who was in the American Revolution in the Battle of Guilford Court House. Both Joseph and Sally were bu. in the family graveyard near Culleoka. Joseph was a trustee of the first school in Culleoka in 1835. Pleasant Grove (Culleoka) Post Office was opened at the Bellenfant homestead about 1835 and continued there for about ten years. ("Century Review of Maury Co., Tn. 1805-1905", pp109-110). Though family tradition and a few histories have said that there was only one child-a son, John-the Maury County census of 1830 showed also a girl in Joseph's household-1 female under 5 yrs. Amis, 15, born in Tennessee, and with Joseph "Ballantphant," 59, a merchant born in Virginia with \$7,200 real estate, and

Sarah, 47, born in North Carolina. Nearby resided A. W. and Susan Winn.<sup>[206]</sup>

In 1860 Joseph Ballanfant, 69, a farmer born in Virginia, with \$12,000 personal estate, \$20,000 real estate, resided in Culleoka, Maury Co., Tenn., with Sarah, 58, native of North Carolina. They lived next to John and Eliza E. Ballanfant.<sup>[207]</sup>

Sarah Ballanfant, 69, resided with her son John Ballanfant and eleven of her grandchildren in Culleoka in 1870 (q.v.).<sup>[208]</sup>

Known child, of perhaps two:

**7. JOHN ["JACK"]**<sup>2</sup> **BELLENFANT** (<sub>1</sub>*Jean*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1793 (1850 census) 1 Jan. 1795 (after 9 July 1787 since under 21 on 9 July 1808), and died 2 Apr. 1867. He married 8 Apr. 1819 [bonded 6 Apr. 1819], Williamson Co., Tenn.,<sup>[209]</sup> **JANE M. SCALES**, who was born about 1802, North Carolina, daughter of Absalom Scales.

Absalom Scales was one of the first 15 families in Eagleville, Rutherford Co., Tenn., in about 1790. The town was known as Manchester

until 1836, and it was part of Williamson Co. until 1877 when it became part of Rutherford Co.<sup>[211]</sup>

In 1820 John Bellenfant, 16-26 [born 1794-1804], resided in Franklin, Williamson Co., Tenn., with a woman 16-26, one male and two female slaves under 14, one female slave 14-26, and [four?] female slaves, 26-45.<sup>[212]</sup>

In 1830 John Bellenfant, 30-40 [born 1790-1800], resided in Williamson Co., Tenn., with a woman 20-30 [born 1800-1810], two boys under 5, three boys 5-10, one female 10-15, two male and two female slaves under 10, three male and four female slaves 10-24, one male slave 24-36, and one male slave 36-55.<sup>[213]</sup>

In 1836 John "Bellenfont" is listed on the tax list for Williamson Co., Tenn., with 300 acres valued at \$3,000 and seven slaves valued at \$4,700.<sup>[214]</sup>

On 20 Nov. 1837 John "Bellonfont" received \$765 as his wife Jane M. Bellonfont's share of her father Absalom Scales's estate, the settlement being with John Scales, presumably Jane's brother, recorded in the September Term 1842 of the Williamson Co., Tenn., Court. At the same sessions were other such legacies for other Scales family members: Joseph G. Scales, David Sayers for his wife Nancy K. Sayer's share, Noah Scales, and Charlotte G. Scales. Each member received \$765. Counting John this makes six heirs.<sup>[215]</sup> Absalom Scales's will of 1833, however,

lists eight heirs including all above, with the addition of Samuel Scales (who is to receive \$75 less than the others) and Nicholas D. Scales.<sup>[216]</sup>

In 1840 "Jno. Bellonfant," 40–50 [born 1790–1800], resided in Williamson Co., Tenn., with a woman 30–40 [born 1800–1810], one boy and one girl under 5, one boy and two girls 5–10, two males and one female 10–15, and one male 15–20, five male and three female slaves under 10, five male and two female slaves 10–24, one male and two female slaves 24–36, and one male and one female slave 36–55.<sup>[217]</sup>

In 1850 J. "Belefent," 57, a farmer born in North Carolina with \$6,800 real estate, resided in Williamson Co., Tenn., with a woman J., 48, born in North Carolina, a female, S. G., 29, males, A. S., 27, J. S., 24, N. D., 23, and J., 20, all farmers, and females, N. D., 17, and C. S., 14, all born in Tennessee, and H. Moore, 22, a farmer born in Tennessee.<sup>[218]</sup> The 1850 slave schedule lists 24 slaves for J. Bellenfant.

In 1860 "Jno." "Bellfant," 67, a farmer born in North Carolina with \$6,000 real and \$30,000 personal estates, resided in Versailles, Rutherford Co., Tenn., with a woman J., 60, born in North Carolina, males, "Jno.," 33, N., 30, and "Jo.," 27, and females, N., 26, and C., 24, all born in Tennessee, and two girls, B. Winn, 5, and C. Winn, 3, both born in Tennessee.<sup>[219]</sup> He was J. "Bellefont" in the 1860 agricultural census, and J. "Billifant" in the 1860 slave schedule.

In 1870 "Absolum Bellaphant," 46, a farmer born in Tennessee with \$4,000 real and \$750 personal estates, resided in Shelbyville, Bedford Co., Tenn., with his wife, Mahala, 24, born in Tennessee, and with two black servants with the Bellaphant surname, Amive, 25, female, and Haustin, 11, a male, both born in Tennessee.<sup>[220]</sup> James Turner, 47, and his family resided nearby.

In 1880 "Absalem" Bellenfant, 56, a farmer born in Tennessee of Tennessee natives, resided in Bedford Co., Tenn., with his wife, Mahala, 36, born in Tennessee of North Carolina natives, son, John W., 9, daughters, Minnie M., 7, and "Charlot" J., 4, and son, "Nicholaus" D., 1, all born in Tennessee, and brother, "Nicholous" D., 50, a farmer born in Tennessee [his parents nativities appear to be N.C. overwritten[?] with Tenn.].<sup>[221]</sup>

In 1900 "Ab." "Bellanphant," 78, a farmer born Apr. 1822 in Tennessee of a fathr born in North Carolina and a mother in Tennessee, resided in Bedford Co., Tenn., with his wife of 31 years, "Mahla," 55, born May 1845 in Tennessee of North Carolina natives, daughter "Charlatte," 23, born July 1876, son, Nicholas, 21, born May 1879, and daughter, Lena, 12, born Feb. 1888, all single and born in Tennessee.<sup>[222]</sup>

"Absolom" S. Bellenfant was a private in Capt. James W. Starnes's Co., Tennessee Volunteers, McLemore's 4th Tennessee Cavalry, Confederate, Civil War, mustered in 30 Oct. 1861, Nashville, age 28, value of horse \$130.<sup>[223]</sup> Surely this is Absalom Scales Bellenfant, but his age doesn't match A. S. "Belefant," 27, in the 1850 census.

Placeholder: Absalom S. Bellenfant, born 19 Apr. 1822 (gravestone), died 11 Dec. 1907, buried in Bellenfant Cem., Bedford Co., Tenn.<sup>[224]</sup> The full name Absalom Scales Bellenfant comes from a Tennessee Confederate widow's pension application.<sup>[225]</sup>

my beloved wife Jane, my two negro women, Phillis & Rose." It appoints "my said two sons John Duke McClaran, & Thomas McClaran, sole Executors." It was witnessed by "Alex: Johnson Jurat 13 July 1816" and "William Johnson Jurat Oct<sup>r</sup> 1816."<sup>[236]</sup> This will is followed in the same record by the will of son Thomas McClaran, and by guardian settlements for several others of the children–e.g., William, Felix, Milcah. (There are many records of the McClaran family here.)

On 30 May 1825 Franklin McClaran entered for 25 acres in Williamson Co., Tenn. It was surveyed on 23 Aug. 1825 and granted 14 June 1826.<sup>[237]</sup>

In 1840 Franklin McClaran, 40–50, resided in Fayette Co., Tenn., with a woman 40–50, two girls under 5, one boy 5–10, one girl 10–15, one female 15–20, three males 20–30, and one male 30–40, and five slaves.<sup>[238]</sup>

In 1850 Franklin McClaran, 60, a farmer born in North Carolina with \$1,760 real estate, resided in Franklin Co., Tenn., with "Moorning," 53, born in North Carolina, and with Francis M., 18, male, Martha D., 14, and Julia F., 12, all born in Tennessee.<sup>[239]</sup> He had seven slaves according to the 1850 slave schedule.

# C: The Drury Yeoman Family

### **First Generation**

**1. DRURY**<sup>1</sup> **YEOMAN**[**S**] was born about 1730, and died after 16 Nov. 1792 when he signed his will in Rockingham Co., N.C., and before it was proved 28 Aug. 1799 there. A document in the court file for the *Grogan vs Yeoman* case about Shadrack and Stokes Yeomans, executors of Drury Yeoman's estate, states, "that Drury Yeomans their Father died Some time in the month of Nov<sup>b</sup> or December in the year 1792."<sup>[401]</sup> Drury married **ELIZABETH** –,<sup>[402]</sup> who was alive at his death.

[The following was posted 8 Dec. 2016 on <Ancestry.com>, by MichelleGreen26, as Drury Yeoman Senior facts. Generally unvetted by me, unless otherwise noted.]

Drury Yeoman [Senior] was born c 1730 and appears in Virginia records in Cumberland County 1750–1753, in Amelia County 1758–1760, Lunenburg County 1762–1764 and Charlotte and Halifax Counties 1764–1779.

He was well established and married to his wife Elizabeth when he first appears in Lunenburg County in Cornwall Parish in 1762 living on the land of James Hill from Amelia County.<sup>[i]</sup> He lived in that area of Lunenburg County, Cornwall Parish, which became Charlotte County in 1764. In 1773 Drury sold 512 acres on Twitty's Creek in the Cornwall Parish of Charlotte Co., VA to the Reverend Thomas Johnson. Drury's wife Elizabeth relinquished her right of dower.<sup>[ii]</sup>

Sep 1779: Drury Yeoman [Senior] sold 200 acres to William Jameson which he had purchased of Charles Sullivant and James Fairlee. Elizabeth his wife relinquished her dower rights.<sup>[v]</sup> This heralds the family move to North Carolina. He moved to the northern part of Guilford County, NC, which became Rockingham County in 1785.

1782: Drury was paid for Revolutionary supplies for the Salisbury District. "This is to certify that Drury Yeoman was allowed thirteen pounds

eleven shillings four pence specie for public claims by the Upper Board of Auditory 31st day of July 1782."<sup>[vi]</sup>

August 1783: Drury Yeoman [Senior] first appears in the Guilford County, NC Court Minutes. He was ordered to appear as a juror at the next county court.<sup>[vii]</sup> The first ten years (1771–1781) of Guilford County Court Minutes were destroyed during the Battle of Guilford Courthouse in 1781. There may have been Yeoman mentions between 1779 and 1782. We will probably never know.

1785: John ODell, Thomas Lomax, John Davison, Richard Davison, Wm Davison, Drure Yomens [*sic*], Shadrich Yomon [*sic*], John Price and Reece Price signed a petition along with many others from Guilford County requesting a division of Guilford into two counties<sup>[viii]</sup>. Drury signed between William Davison and John Price and Reece Price. Therefore, he was probably living somewhere near both of these families.<sup>[ix]</sup>

1790: Drury Yeoman [Senior] was in the 1790 Federal Census for Rockingham Co., NC. He listed 4 adult males, 3 females and 18 slaves. I have not found a reference to where he was living at the time. With 18 slaves, he must have been renting or leasing a plantation. Those listed next to him on the census were: Moses Lillard, William Patterson, Christopher Hand, John Mackie, Joseph Hopper, Jacob Cantril and John Murphy.

February 23, 1792: Drury Yeoman [Senior] purchased 298 acres on Dan River in Rockingham Co., NC called "The Bent" from James Grant Senior and John Grant (of Caswell Co., NC).<sup>[si]</sup> [verified]

On 31 July 1782 Drury Yeoman was allowed £13.11.4 in a Revolutionary War pay voucher, by the Salisbury Dist., N.C., "Upper Board of Auditors."[403]

In Aug. 1783 "Drewry" Yeoman was called to report for possible jury duty in Guilford Co., N.C., court, along with James Sanders.<sup>[404]</sup>

N.B. In 1785 Rockingham Co., N.C., was formed from the upper half of Guilford Co.

In 1790 "Drewry" Yeoman resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with four males over 16, three females, and 18 slaves.<sup>[405]</sup>

On 23 Feb. 1792 Drury Yeoman bought 298 acres on Dan River for £1,000 (Virginia money) from James Grant Sr. and John Grant of

Caswell Co., N.C. (This deed is recorded just after that in the preceding paragraph.)<sup>[406]</sup>

On 16 Nov. 1792 Drury Yeoman "Sent" of Rockingham Co., N.C., signed his will, and it was proved 28 Aug. 1799. It mentions "my beloved wife Elizabeth," "negroes to wit Goliah & Rachel," "my daughter [unreadable, but deduced from the other items to be Lucy or Lucey two Negroes Girls Jane and Pott," "my daughter Nancey one negro girl by the name of Milley," "my daughter Elizabeth one Negro Girl named Dinah," "my Grand daughter Elizabeth Price one Negro Girl by the name of Charlotte," "my Daughter Susannah one yellow Girl by the name of Dolt," "the Land I now live on containg [sic] two hundred & ninety Eight acres [from later context, on Dan River]," "my Sons Shaderick Stokes & Drury," "my Said Son Stokes one Negro Boy by the name of Leonard," "my Said Children to wit, to Nancey Odell ... my two Grand Daughters Sarah & Mary Price ... my daughter Elizabeth ... my daughter Lucey ... my daughter Susanah ... my Grand daughter Lucey Davison." He appoints his wife and three sons the executors. Witnesses were George Peav, Mary Peav, and Lenav Williams.<sup>[407]</sup>

In the 69-page estate file for Drury Yeoman is found this statement in an affidavit: "deponent was present some little time before Drewry Yeomans Se<sup>r</sup> departed this Life & heard the said Drewry Yeomans Se<sup>r</sup> call his **son in Law John Bellenfant** to him and requested him to take the Negro Girl Charlotte which he had given to his **grand daughter Betsy Price**, who was then living with the said Bellenfant, that the said negro might live with her." [Might there have been a Lucinda Yeoman (as claimed in some Ancestry.com family trees) who married Reece Price? I have no evidence of her at all.]

+ 6 v NANCY<sup>2</sup> YEOMAN, married (1) LEWIS ODELL, possibly married (2) RE[E]CE PRICE, and had six children. All we know for sure is that Reece married one of Drury Yeoman Sr.'s daughters, (not Louisa probably, but one of Nancy, Elizabeth, or Susannah), but we don't know which one. Another possibility is that he married a Yeoman daughter-in-law and adopted her Yeoman children as his own.

## Second Generation

2. SHADRACK [SHADRACH]<sup>2</sup> YEOMAN (<sub>1</sub>Drury<sup>1</sup>) was born 1755-1774 (1800 census). He signed his will (q.v.) on 13 Mar. 1802, Rockingham Co., N.C., and died before 21 Mar. 1802, when an affidavit in Drury Sr.'s estate file (image 41 of 69) was signed which mentions "Susannah Yeoman Executrix of Shadrach Yeoman deceased." He married **SU-SAN[NA]** –, who was born about 1778, Virginia, and died before 1 July 1852, the division of slaves among her heirs. The second document in Drury Sr.'s 69-page estate file, dated 29 Aug. 1803, is signed "Shadrack Yeoman | in right of his wife Susanna." Image 36 of 69 uses the same terminology.

Susanna married, second, before Oct. (of probably) 1804 (see slave Charlotte settlement below) Moses Lomax. Moses signed his will 28 Nov 1841, and it was proved in the Feb. 1842 session of the Rockingham Co., N.C., court.

In 1800 Shadrach Yeoman, 26–45 [born 1755–1774], resided in Salisbury District, Rockingham Co., N.C., with two boys and one girl under 10, one female 10–16, one female 16–26, one male and two females 26–45, and 26 slaves. Next to him was listed Stokes Yeoman.<sup>[410]</sup>

Shadrach signed his will 13 Mar. 1802, Rockingham Co., N.C. It mentions "my Nephew Hambleton Yeoman son of my Sister Susanna Yeoman," "my Sister Elizabeth Davis" "my Brother Stokes Yeoman," and

"my Friend Robert Gallaway."<sup>[411]</sup> He died before 21 Mar. 1802 by the evidence already given (image 41 of 69). He had certainly died by 15 Jan. 1803 when the Rockingham County sheriff sold two of Shadrach's slaves to raise money, presumably for settlement of the estate. A witness was Sarah Price.<sup>[412]</sup>

The 69-page case appears to have been settled by a document (image 60 of 69) wherein "Moses Lomax Executor in right of his Wife Susannah of the last Will of Shadrach Yeoman deceased," delivers the slave girl Charlotte to the petitioners Bartholomew and Elizabeth Grogan, apparently dated Oct. 1804 (but the last two digits of the year are difficult to read, but 1804 is consistent with the births of Moses Lomax's children).

In 1810 Moses Lomax, 26–45, resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with a woman 26–45 [born 1765–1784] with three boys and two girls under 10, and seven slaves.<sup>[413]</sup>

On 28 Nov 1841 Moses Lomax of Rockingham Co., N.C., signed his will, and it was proved the February Session 1842 of the court. It mentions "my beloved wife Susan Lomax," "all my Negroes (to wit) Sarah Moses Philis & her two Children Caroline & [Julianz?] Charlotte & hir Child Enmisty during his natural life," "my three Children (to wit) my son Shaderack N. Lomax and my two daughters Eliza A. Lomax & Susan Lomax," "my four Children (to Wit) Shaderick N. Lomax Albert Lomax Eliza A Lomax and Susan Lomax." It names "Son Albert Lomax the Sole Executor." Witnesses were E. Welty Jr. and William Simpson.<sup>[414]</sup>

In 1850 Susan Lomax, 72, born in Virginia, resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with "Shaderick," 44, Elizabeth, 43, Albert, 41, Susan Jr., 40, all born in North Carolina, and with Patrick Williams, 20, Mary J. Lomax, 18, Hamilton [presumably Lomax], 16, a laborer, all born in North Carolina, and with one black man, John Couzens, 50, born in North

Carolina. Shaderick. Albert, and Patrick were all occupied in "Carriages."<sup>[415]</sup>

On 1 July 1852 the slaves of Susan Lomax, deceased, left to her by Moses Lomax in his will, are ordered divided among the four heirs, "Shadrack Lomax, Albert Lomax, Elizabeth Ann Lomax, & Susan Lomax." Signed by S. N. Lomax, Albert Lomax, Eliza Ann Lomax, and Susan Lomax. It was accomplished that same date.<sup>[416]</sup>

**3.** STOKES<sup>2</sup> YEOMAN[S] [EMMONS] (<sub>1</sub>Drury<sup>1</sup>) was born 1760–1770 (1830 and 1840 censuses). He married (licensed and bonded) 24 Jan. 1794, Rockingham Co., N.C.,<sup>[417]</sup> LUCY CUNINGHAM, who was born 1776 (1850 census), Virginia.

On 17 July 1793 Stokes Yeomans entered for 50 acres in Anson Co., N.C. It was surveyed 6 May 1796 on "the North Prong of Richardsons Creek," and granted 1 July 1797.<sup>[418]</sup> N.B. Anson Co. lies on the mid-state southern border with South Carolina.

In 1800 Stokes Yeoman, 26–45, resided in Salisbury District, Rockingham Co., N.C., with one boy and three girls under 10, one female

10–16, one female 16–26, one male and two females 26–45, and 1 slave. Next to him was listed Shadrach Yeoman.<sup>[419]</sup>

In 1810 Stokes "Yommons," over 45, resided in Montgomery Co., Ky., with a woman 26–45, and another man over 45, one boy and four girls under 10, one male and one female 10–16.<sup>[420]</sup>

N.B. In 1811 Bath Co. was formed from about half of Montgomery Co., N.C.

In 1820 Stokes "Yewman," over 45, resided in Bloomfield, Bath Co., Ky., with a woman over 45, four boys and one girl under 10, one male and one female 10–16, one male 18–26, and four females 16–26. James Cunningham is listed next to Stokes.<sup>[421]</sup>

In 1830 "Emmons Stokes," 60–70 [born 1760–1770], resided in Bath Co., Ky., with a woman 50–60, two boys 5–10, one male and one female, 15–20, one male and two females 20–30. Listed next is "Cavines Emmans," 30–40.<sup>[422]</sup> **N.B. This is the first instance I've seen of Yeomans being taken as Emmons**, although it is frequently reported so. In this census the first name precedes the surname.

In 1840 Stokes Emmons, 70–80 [born 1760–1770], resided "West of Slate Creek" in Bath Co., Ky., with a woman 50–60, three males and one female 20–30, one female 30–40, and one male 60–70. Listed next is Calvin Emmons, 40–50, then Drury Emmons, 30–40, then Nancy Duby, 20–30, and on the same census page, Alex Emmons, 20–30.<sup>[423]</sup>

In 1850 Lucy Emmons, 74, a farmer born in Virginia with \$1,500 real estate, resided in Bath Co., Ky., with James M., 32, Nancy Eaton, 24, Martha, 4, Jane, 1, Drury Emmons, 45, Lucy A., 15, Emily Q., 12, Louisa, 10, all born in Kentucky. Residing next door in one direction was W. W. Emmons, 34, a farmer with \$1,800 real estate, Rachail, 26, William S., 11, and Lucy J., 1, all born in Kentucky. And in the other direction was Alexander Emmons, 35, a farmer with \$600 real estate, Mariah, 23, George F., 6, James A., 4, and Calvinest, 3, all born in Kentucky. And beyond them Nancy Duby, 44, a farmer with \$660 real es-

tate, Drury [which is why I include her] J., 18, and Carolina, 11, all born in Kentucky.<sup>[424]</sup>

Known children:

- 13 i CALVIN[EST]<sup>3</sup> EMMONS, born 1790–1800. I take his full name from nephew Calvinest, son of Alexander Emmons.
- 14 ii DRURY<sup>3</sup> EMMONS, born about 1805, Kentucky, and had at least three children: (1) Lucy A.<sup>4</sup> Emmons, born about 1835, Kentucky; (2) Emily Q.<sup>4</sup> Emmons, born about 1838, Kentucky; and (3) Louisa<sup>4</sup> Emmons, born about 1840, Kentucky.
- 15 iii NANCY<sup>3</sup> EMMONS, born about 1806, Kentucky, married DUBY, and had at least two children: (1) Drury J.<sup>4</sup> Duby, born about 1832, Kentucky; and (2) Carolina<sup>4</sup> Duby, born about 1839, Kentucky. **6.** NANCY<sup>2</sup> YEOMAN (<sub>1</sub>*Drury*<sup>1</sup>) married (1) before 16 Nov. 1792 (when her father signed his will) LEWIS ODELL (his first name taken from the will of Drury Yeoman Jr., although Lewis Odell's relationship is not directly stated there; the surname is from "Nancey Odell" in her father's will of 1792). She married (2) RE[E]CE PRICE. N.B. Reece's first wife might not be Nancy Yeoman. It is his second wife who is Nancy, said to be Nancy Parrish.

In 1790 Lewis Odell, over 16, resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with one under 16, and four females.<sup>[426]</sup> Nearby was Robert Sanders, with four males over 16, one male under 16, and three females.

On 9 Apr. 1812 "Rece" Price signed his will in Rockingham Co., N.C., and it was proved in the Rockingham Court of Pleas and Sessions, August Term 1830. It mentions "my dearly beloved wife Nancy Price," "my Daughter Elizabeth Grogan (wife of Bartholomew Grogan Jun<sup>r</sup>)," "my Daughter Sally Pusby (wife of George Pusby)," "my Son Samuel Price," "my son Drury Price," "my son William Price," "my Daughter Polly Roberts (wife of James Roberts Jun<sup>r</sup>)," "for and all which may be born hereafter of the body of my said wife Nancy during my life, or whither nine months thereafter, to wit, John Price Gooden Price Anna Price Harden Price Jeremiah Price Judy Price and Thomas Price [I don't know what this last phrase means; one interpretation is that these are second wife Nancy's children, while the others named are from a first wife in the Yeoman family, not necessarily Nancy Yeoman. A tree on Ancestry.com has the two wives as Lucinda Yeoman and Nancy Parrish, but there was no Lucinda Yeoman]." It appointed his wife Nancy Price, James Parish, and John Parish Sr. executors.<sup>[427]</sup>

In 1850 Nancy Price, 80 [born about 1770], born in North Carolina, resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., in the household of Thomas D. Price, 39, born in North Carolina, and his family.<sup>[428]</sup>

Known children of the second marriage, to Reece Price (in his will order):

19 i ELIZABETH [BETSY]<sup>3</sup> PRICE, married in the home of her father,<sup>[429]</sup> BARTHOLOMEW GROGAN JR. The 69-page estate file of Drury

In 1850 "Parham" Ray, 77, born in Virginia, resided in Sullivan Co., Mo., with the family of George Yardley, 37, born in Missouri,

and Sarah L. Yardley, 37, born in North Carolina.<sup>[439]</sup> George Yardley married 8 Mar. 1838, St. Charles Co., Mo., Sarah L. "Wray."<sup>[440]</sup>

- V PLEASANT<sup>2</sup> RAY. He signed his will in Rockingham Co., N.C., on 24 Sept. 1846, proved Nov. 1846. It mentions "my Sister Salley Ballaphant."<sup>[441]</sup>
- 7 vi PAYTON/PAXTON<sup>2</sup> RAY, a son, had at least two children: (1) Dorcus<sup>3</sup> Ray; and (2) Sallie<sup>3</sup> Ray. # E: The James Sanders [Saunders] Family

## **First Generation**

**1. JAMES**<sup>1</sup> **SANDERS [SAUNDERS]**, according to a family Bible record (see below), was born 17 July 1716, and died at age 117 years 10 months(!) on 17 May 1834.<sup>[443]</sup> He married **ALICE** –, who was born 14 Apr. 1741, and died 17 Sept. 1809 (all from the same Bible record).

As regards the variant spelling of the surname, Teresa Wilson, a seventh generation descendant from James Sanders Sr., says:

Although the Sanders [name] was spelled both ways in county records, our early Sanders family seemed to spell it Sanders and pronounce it Saunders (Sahn ders). My family eventually started spelling it Saunders.

Geographical note: In 1807 in Tennessee, Williamson County was subdivided into (a smaller) Williamson County, Maury County, and a non-county portion. In 1809 the non-county portion was subdivided into Giles County and a smaller non-county portion. This division became effective in 1810. Also, Hickman County was created (pending) in 1807 from Dickson County which lay parallel and just east of the original Williamson County. In 1807 Maury County was partially formed from Dickson County. Hickman County became effective in 1808. Hickman abuts Maury, Williamson, and was separated from Giles (after 1809) by only a small strip of non-county land.

An article by Robert W. Carter, Dec. 1979, in *The Journal of Rocking-ham County History and Genealogy*, Mills in Simpsonville Township: Part III:

#### The James Saunders Mill

The Saunders Mill was located on Bold Run Creek, the largest eastern tributary of Rock House Creek. The millsite is approximately one-half mile

west of the bridge on State Road #2371 (Gunntown Road). The mill dam was located one-fourth mile below the "Indian Cave." Nearby Rock House Creek apparently took its name from this small cave . . .

James Saunders settled in the area by the 1770's. Sometime prior to 1778 he purchased land from William Hill that included several acres of rich creek bottom land at the confluence of Brush Fork and Rock House Creek. On November 21, 1778, Saunders entered a claim for 500 acres of vacant state land adjacent to his deeded land. This tract of land was surveyed by Abraham Phillips on February 1, 1780, and granted to Saunders on October 22, 1782. This land lay north of Abraham Phillips' 500 acres state grant and included the millsite, and more bottom land on Rock House, Bold Run and Haw Branch.

There is no mention of Saunders Mill until 1809; however, there is a possibility it was constructed before 1781. After the Battle of Guilford Court House on March 15, 1781, General Green's men returned to Speedwell Iron Works. On March 16, Colonel William Washington and Captain Robert Kirkwood marched their troops to James Saunders' farm and encamped there on the 16th, 17th, 18th and on the morning of the 19th they marched south toward Guilford Court House. Captain Abraham Phillips accompanied the troops as guide some distance east of Guilford Court House and then returned home. Although the Saunders farm was the site of a ford across Rock House Creek and the sourthern part of the farm lay on a high bluff overlooking the confluence of several creeks, the site would seem more important as a campsite if Saunders had erected his mill before this date.

As early as 1786 James Saunders began selling tracts of his land. He continued selling land into the early 1800's mostly to members of his family. In 1790 he owned no slaves but in the 1810 census he is listed as the owner of four slaves. On October 12, 1810, he gave his daughter Jane two slaves. Saunders death date is unknown. He was buried on his farm in a family cemetery that continued to be used by members of his family for many years.

On November 26, 1800 James Saunders sold his son William a 363 acre farm including the mill. In 1810 William Saunders sold 200 acres of this tract to Thomas Lytle . . . (continues with various owners of the mill).

Both ends of the Saunders' Mill dam remain with the center section washed out. The millsite is approximately 200 yards below the rock dam

on the south side of Bold Run. Only a small pile of rocks mark the site of the mill.<sup>[444]</sup>

I will refer to the following as the Saunders Family Bible. The items were transcribed by a family member, Teresa (Wilson) Wiese, from the family Bible of Thomas Womack Saunders and Mary M. Hair, with pages from an older Bible belonging to James and Alice Saunders.<sup>[445]</sup> The following is specifically the information from the pages of the older Bible:

### Births:

James Sanders senr. was born July the 17th 1716 and departed this life in May the 17th 1834.

Alice Sanders wife of James Sanders was born April the 14th 1741 and departed this life September the 17th 1809.

Elenor Sanders daughter of James Sanders and Alice his wife was born April 14th 1774 & departed this life in September the 17th day of 1794.

James Sanders son of James Sanders and Alice his wife was born the 7th of October 1768.

Isabel Sanders daughter of James Sanders and Alice his wife was born the 25th of February 1770.

John Sanders son of James Sanders and Alice his wife . . . was born January . . . 6th 1772.

Elizabeth Sanders . . . ter of James Sanders . . . Alice his Wife was bo . . . February the 6th 17 . . .

From Find a Grave (unvetted):

James Saunders/Sanders Sr. was born July 17, 1716 and died May 17, 1834 at the age of 117 years. He settled near Rock House Creek in Rockingham County, North Carolina by 1770 and owned and operated a mill on his land on Bold Run Creek. He was buried in the family cemetery on his farm. He and wife Alice (maiden name unknown) had at least nine children. Their children would eventually marry into the Walker, Fitts, Pirkle, Wall, Roach, and Bellenfant families of the area. Some of their children/descendants stayed in Rockingham County while others moved to Tennessee, Illinois, and Georgia. (Teresa Wilson Wiese)<sup>[447]</sup>

Support for the biography of James Sanders Sr. above, claimed to be from a Bible record (Note the author of the item):

The Bible states: James Sanders Sr. b. 7-17-1716, died 5-17-1834, aged 117 years 10 mons, Alice Sanders, his wife b. 4-14-1741 died 9-17-1809, aged 68 years, One of their sons was: William Sanders b. 12-15-1783 [*sic*]. This could be your Wm T. I think. (Robert T. Carter Jr.)<sup>[448]</sup>

In Aug. 1783 James Sanders was called to report for possible jury duty in Guilford Co., N.C., court, along with "Drewry" Yeoman.<sup>[449]</sup>

N.B. In 1785 Rockingham Co., N.C., was formed from the upper half of Guilford Co.

On 30 Aug. 1786 James Sanders [variant Saunders] of Rockingham Co., N.C., sold to Alexander McClaran of the same place 25 acres in Rockingham Co. for £40. The land was part of a 320-acre tract granted to James Simms by "John Earl Granvilles Office" in 1760. Then Simms conveyed it to William Hill, and Hill conveyed it to James Sanders, "Situate on the East Side of Great Rock house Creek and the North Side of the Bould Run" in Rockingham Co. Witnesses were George Tankersley, James Hayes, and Abner Johnson.<sup>[450]</sup>

In 1790 James Sanders "Sen<sup>r</sup>" resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with two males over 16, three males under 16, six females, and no slaves.<sup>[451]</sup> Also Robert Sanders, 4,1,3, 0, and "Ja<sup>s</sup>" Sanders "Jn<sup>r</sup>", 2,0,1, 0, were listed there. On the same page as James Sr. is listed is Alexander McClaran, 1,3,3, 3.

On 26 Nov. 1800, James Sanders of Rockingham Co., N.C., sold 285 acres in Rockingham Co., N.C., to Robert Sanders Jr. "in Consideration to him of the Natural Love and Affection which he beareth unto his son" and for £100, the land lying "on Both sides of Great Rockhouse Creek." The plot description mentions neighbors Abraham Philips, Stephen Sanders, James Sanders Jr. Witnesses: A. Philips and Ellarson Young.<sup>[452]</sup>

On 26 Nov. 1800, James Sanders of Rockingham Co., N.C., sold 363 acres in Rockingham Co., N.C., to William Sanders "in Consideration to him of the Natural Love and Affection which he beareth unto his son" and for £150, the land lying "on Both sides of Great Rockhouse Creek." The plot description mentions neighbors James Sanders Jr., Benjamin Haggard, Alexander "McClarron," Robert Sanders, and "the mouth of the Brushey Fork of said creek." Witnesses: A. Philips, Ellarson Young, and V. Wheeler.<sup>[453]</sup>

In 1800 James Sanders resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., 01101,21101,00, that is, with two girls under 10, one boy and one girl 10–16, one male and one female 16–26, and one male and one female over 45, and no slaves.<sup>[454]</sup> On the same page was Stephen Sanders, 30010,10010,00.

In 1810 James Saunders "Sen<sup>r</sup>", over 45, resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with one female 16–26, and four slaves.<sup>[455]</sup>

In 1820 James Saunders, over 45, resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., alone, with no slaves. Next to him was listed Agnes Wall.<sup>[456]</sup>

Placeholder: In 1820 Jane Saunders, 26–45 [born 1775–1794], resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with three boys under 10, one male 10–16, and one female 16–26, and three slaves.<sup>[457]</sup>

In 1830 one male over 100 [presumably James Sanders Sr.] resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., in the household of Jane Saunders, 30–40 [born 1790–1800], with one girl under 5, one boy 5–10, one male 10–15, two

males 15–20, and one male 20–30, and with seven slaves.<sup>[458]</sup> Jane was presumably the wife of one of James's sons, but I haven't found one. Or she might have been an unmarried daughter not listed in the Family Bible.

Placeholder: In 1840 Jane Saunders, 40–50 [born 1790–1800], resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with one female 10–15, one male 15–20, and with eight slaves.<sup>[459]</sup> N.B. Combining the three censuses for Jane, she must have been born 1790–1794. Since Alice, James's wife, was born 1741, she would have been 49–54, almost surely too old to be Jane's mother.

## Second Generation

**2.** JAMES<sup>2</sup> SANDERS [SAUNDERS] JR. (<sub>1</sub>*James*<sup>1</sup>) was born 7 Oct. 1768, died before 1850. He married (bonded) 3 Apr. 1790, Rockingham Co., N.C.,<sup>[461]</sup> SARAH WALKER, who was born 1770–1780, and died about 1806 (which doesn't fit for either putative child). James served as bondsman on his sister's Isabel's marriage bond (q.v.).

The following dense (and unvetted) genealogy is from a 1906 history of Maury Co., Tenn. It seems to be about descendents of James Sr. and Alice Sanders. The trouble is that there is no record of James Sr. having a son named Alford in 1774. In fact, he had a daughter Elenor in 1774. But the fact that this James Saunders died at 108, came originally from Rockingham Co., N.C., and had a mill seems to be more than coincidence. It is better to believe that it is about James Sanders Jr., gets Alford's birthdate wrong (but James Jr. indeed did have a son Alford or Alfred), and conflates James Sr.'s ancient age with James Jr.'s. There's so much wrong with this account! but let's pursue it for hints. I will place in red those items that are wrong or are probably wrong:

### Cave Spring Vicinity.

... At this point is found the well-known cave spring of A. V. Scott, and  $\frac{1}{4}$  m. distant on the J. L. Saunders place is a similar spring. In either of these are subterranean paths for a half mile or more, with the usual cave attractions ....

J. L. Saunders, b., Nov. 16, 47, 2 m. N. W. of Williamsport, is son of Allen (b. Dec. 29, 20, d. Oct. 17, 96) and Martha (b. June 8, 28, d. May 5, 91) Saunders. Allen was son of Alford M. (1774–1865) and Sallie (b.

1802, d. 84) (Harris) Saunders; Martha was dau. of Isaiah and Mary A. (b. Mar. 7, 1788, d. Feb. 24, 90) Davis. Alford was son of James (who died aged 108) and – (Walker) Saunders; Mary was dau. of Jas. Grimes. Isaiah was a millwright, and built the early mills on Snow, Turkey, and Leiper's Creeks. J. L., June 18, 68, mar. Annie E. (b. June 28, 48, d. Aug. 4, 98), dau. of Robt. and Eliza (McKnight) Jack. Their children–W. P.; Martha L., wife of L. L. Simmons; Eudora, deceased; R. A., T. J.; Nancy, wife of J. W. Duncan; B. L., Malinda Jane, and Carrie Mai. Robert was son of Andy Jack. Mr. Saunders' ancestors were from Rockingham, N. C. In 98, J. L. mar. Serena, b. 62, sister of W. F. Scott, mentioned below. Mr. Saunders owns 206 acres at Cave Springs.

**R. A. Saunders**, b., May 23, 77, at Santa Fé, **is son of above. He married Lula**, b. Dec. 19, 78, dau. of P. F. and Jane N. **Lilies**. P. F. was son of Willis and Martha (Garner) Liles; Jane was dau. of W. and Nancy (Hines) Liles. **He is farming on his father's place**, 2 ½ m. W. of Isom . . .

**E.** Saunders, b. at Water Valley, Dec. 27, 56, is brother of J. L. Saunders, mentioned above. In 89, he mar. Tennie, b. June 17, 60, dau. of H. and Mary J. (b. Feb. 26, 33, d. Feb. 19, 1900) (Grimmett) Smith. She later mar. John Simmons. H. was son of Wiley and Polly (Strongfellow) Smith; Mary was dau. of Wm. Grimmett, who fought at the battle of New Orleans, and Betsy (McInnally) Grimmett. Mr. Saunders is farming near Cave Springs.<sup>[462]</sup>

In 1790 "Ja<sup>s</sup>" Sanders "Jn<sup>r</sup>" resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with two males over 16 [implies James was born before 1774], one female, and no slaves.<sup>[463]</sup>

In 1810 James Saunders, 26–45, resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with a woman 26–45, two boys and one girl under 10, one female 10–16, two males 16–26, and no slaves.<sup>[464]</sup>

This was also entered in the sketch for James Sr., where it also fits: In 1820 James Saunders, over 45, resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., alone, with no slaves. Next to him was listed Agnes Wall.<sup>[465]</sup>

In 1840 James Sanders, 70–80 [implies born 1760–1770], resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with a woman 60–70 [implies born 1770–1780], one male and one female 10–15, one male 20–30, and one male 30–40, and no slaves.<sup>[466]</sup>

Children (inferred from the family Bible, see father's sketch):

- + 11 i **?ALFRED W.<sup>3</sup> SANDERS [SAUNDERS]**, born about 1809, North Carolina, married **RUTH[A] ROACH**, and had 11 children.
- + 12 ii ?REASON C.<sup>3</sup> SANDERS [SAUNDERS], born 18 Jan. 1818 about 1818, North Carolina, married MARY ANN WOMACK, and had at least five children.

**3. ISABEL**<sup>2</sup> **SANDERS [SAUNDERS]** (<sub>1</sub>*James*<sup>1</sup>) was born 25 Feb. 1770 (Family Bible), North Carolina (1850 census), and died after the 1860 census (which lists her at the improbable age of 110). She married (bonded) 14 Apr. 1797, Rockingham Co., N.C.,<sup>[467]</sup> **JOSEPH FITTS**, who was born 1770–1780, and died before the 1850 census.

In 1830 Joseph Fitts, 50–60, resided in Crawford Co., Ill., with a woman 50–60 [born 1770–1780], and with one female 10–15, one male 15–20, and one male 20–30. Listed next was James Fitts, 20–30, with a woman 20–30, and next to them was Andrew Fitts, 20–30, with a woman 20–30. Nearby was Nathan Sanders.<sup>[468]</sup>

Placeholder: In 1840 Joseph Fitts, 30–40 [born 1800–1810], resided in Crawford Co., Ill., with a woman 20–30 [born 1810–1820], and with two females under 5, and one male and one female 5–10. Listed next was a Saunders [first name indistinct, "Robert" perhaps].<sup>[469]</sup> N.B. There was apparently another Joseph Fitts, 30–40, in the county.<sup>[470]</sup>

In 1850 Isabel Fitts, 80, born in North Carolina, illiterate, resided in Crawford Co., Ill., in the household of Samuel Shoulders, 37, a farmer born in Kentucky with \$400 real estate, and with "Allsey," 37, born in Tennessee, Aaron, 10, William, 8, Henry, 4, and Jackson, 1, all born in Illinois. Next door was James Fitts, 38, a farmer of indistinct nativity, and his family.<sup>[471]</sup>

In 1860 Isabel Fitts, 110 [*sic*!], born in North Carolina, resided in Crawford Co., Ill., in the household of Samuel Shoulders, 40 [*sic*], a laborer born in Kentucky with \$400 real and \$200 personal estates, and with "Alice," 43, born in Tennessee, Aaron, 19, William, 17, Henry, 12, James, 9, Andrew, 5, Samuel, 5, and John, 3 all born in Illinois. There were two Fitts families nearby.<sup>[472]</sup>

N.B. Samuel's wife was "Ailcy" Shoulders, 64, born in Kentucky, in the 1870 census for New Hebron, Honey Creek Twp., Crawford Co., Ill.<sup>[473]</sup>

Placeholder: In 1850 James Fitts, 38, a farmer born in [indistinct], resided in Crawford Co., Ill., with Agnes, 38, born in Kentucky, Nancy, 19, Joseph, 17, a farmer, Isabel, 15, Samuel, 13, Robert, 11, and Angeline, 2, all born in Illinois. Next door was Isabel Fitts, 80, born in North Carolina. Both James and Agnes were illiterate.<sup>[474]</sup>

Placeholder: Eliza "Fattz" married 15 May 1839, Crawford Co., Ill.,<sup>[475]</sup> Samuel Shoulders Jr. See the footnote for variations on her name:

Eliza Fattz, Elsy Fittz, Agnes Filts, Polly Fitts, Alcia Caroline –, A. C. Fitts, and Alsrey Fitch. Almost certainly her surname was Fitts, and she was Alsey Shoulders, daughter of the Isabel Fitts in the 1850 census.

Placeholder: Elsie C. Shoulders, born 16 Jan. 1811 (calculated), died 1 May 1877, aged 66 years 3 months 15 days, was buried in Updike Cem., Pt. Jackson, Crawford Co., Ill., married to S. Shoulders.<sup>[476]</sup> Samuel Shoulders apparently shares the same gravestone, but the photograph is too dark to read. *Find a Grave* gives these: born Dec. 1800, died 15 Apr. 1876.

6. ELIZABETH<sup>2</sup> SANDERS [SAUNDERS] (<sub>1</sub>*James*<sup>1</sup>) was born 6 Feb 177[5?]. She married (bonded and licensed) 3 Oct. 1796, Rockingham Co., N.C.,<sup>[477]</sup> JACOB PIRKLE, who was born about 1763, North Carolina.

From a 1933 genealogy of the Pirkle family (unvetted):

Jacob, son of John and – Dibbs Pirkle, married Elizabeth Saunders Oct. 31, 1796, Rockingham Co., N.C.

Jacob was born 1763, North Carolina. He served in the War of the Revolution. Saw service under John Pirkle, Sr.

Jacob and Elizabeth moved to Hall Co., Ga., about 1819, then to Forsyth Co., Ga., where they both died at a very ripe age.

Children: Nathaniel, born in 1815, N.C., married Elizabeth Bryant; Robert W., born 1804, N.C., married Lucind Thurmond, second Bethany Brown; John; James; Ambros<sub>e</sub> [sic] Jacob, born in 1827 [sic], N.C., married Sarah Pirkle, daughter of Isaac and Rebecca Tanner Pirkle; Polly Ann, married Gus Bryant; Rachael, married William McKey Nov. 3, 1818,

parents: Samuel Shoulders and A. C. Fitts, bride's parents: Thomas Clark and Martha Mullins; *Ill. In 1810 Jacob Pirkle, 26–45, resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with a woman 26–45, and with two boys and two girls, under 10, and one male and one female 10–16.<sup>[479]</sup>

In 1820 Jacob Pirkle [Jr.?], over 45, resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with a woman 26–45, and with three boys and five girls, under 10, two males and one female 10–16, one male 18–26, and two females 16–26, and two slaves.<sup>[480]</sup>

In 1850 Jacob Pirkle, 87 [born about 1763], a farmer born in North Carolina with \$250 real estate, resided in Hall Co., Ga., with E., 64 [born about 1786], a female born in North Carolina. Next door resided William Pirkle, 53 [born about 1797], born in North Carolina, with his family.<sup>[481]</sup>

**7. AGNES**<sup>2</sup> **SANDERS [SAUNDERS]** (<sub>1</sub>*James*<sup>1</sup>) was born 9 Apr. 1778,<sup>[482]</sup> and died (probate) at or before the August Term 1847 of the court at Rockingham Co., N.C. She married (bonded) (1) 5 Feb. 1800, Rockingham Co., N.C.,<sup>[483]</sup> **CLAIBORNE WALL**, who was born 1755–1774, son of John and Catharine (–) Wall,<sup>[484]</sup> and who died after he signed his will on 21 July 1802 in Rockingham Co., N.C. Agnes married (2) after the 1820 census and before the 1828 will for Elizabeth and certainly before the 1830 probate for Mary H. which mentions "Agness Peay" (see below) **JOHN PEAY**,<sup>1</sup> who had died before Agnes's will of 1840. His name was stated in his daughter Elizabeth's noncupative will (q.v.).

In 1800 "Clabourn" Wall, 26–45, resided in Salisbury, Rockingham Co., N.C., with a woman 26–45, and three slaves.<sup>[485]</sup>

On 21 July 1802 "Claybourn" Wall signed his will in Rockingham Co., N.C. It mentions "my beloved wife Agga," a Negro woman Sarah, "my beloved daughter Elly," a Negro girl Eff, "the Child my wife is pregnant with," "Fifty acres of land part of the tract possesed [*sic*] by Peter Wall and myself," his wife and Moses Lomax executors, witnesses: John Wall Sr., Peter Wall, and Anna Saunders [probably Agnes's sister].<sup>[486]</sup>

Placeholder: In 1810 Ambrose Peay, 26–45, resided in Salisbury, Rockingham Co., N.C., with a woman 26–45, one boy and two girls under 10, and one female 16–26, and three slaves. Listed two removed from Peter Wall.<sup>[487]</sup> N.B. Ambrose is sometimes given, in online genealogies without proof, as Agnes's husband, but I've found no other evidence than this, and it's not strong.

In 1820 Agnes Wall, 26–45 [born 1775–1794], resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with one boy under 10 [born 1810–1820], one female 10–16 [born 1804–1810], one male 16–18 [born 1802–1804, fits Claiborne Jr.], one female 16–26 [born 1794–1804, fits Eleanor], and six slaves. Next to her was listed James Saunders (Sr., or possibly Jr.).<sup>[488]</sup>

In 1830 John Peay, 40–50 [born 1780–1790], resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with two women 30–40 [born 1790–1800, doesn't fit Agnes], one boy under 5, and one male and one female, 15–20, and no slaves.<sup>[489]</sup>

On 18 Apr. 1828 a noncupative will of Elizabeth Peay was recorded in Rockingham Co., N.C., and it was proved Aug. (sessions) 1830 in the Rockingham Co. court. The will mentions "her father John Peay," and "her Brother George Washington Peay."<sup>[490]</sup>

On 29 June 1829 Mary H. Peay signed her will in Rockingham Co., N.C., and it was proved Aug. (sessions) 1830 in the Rockingham Co. court. In the will she mentioned "my beloved mother Agatha [*sic*, should be Agnes?] Peay," "my two negroes Sally and her child Caroline," "my brother George Washington Peay," "my Brother Claibourn Wall," "my Sister Elnor [*sic*] Wright and her two Daughters Ann Eliza and Mary P Wright." Executor was "my Brother Claibourn Wall." Witnesses were James H. May and James T. Morehead. In the 1830 probate, the executor and the two witnesses renounced administration, and "Agness" Peay was made administratrix.<sup>[491]</sup>

On 23 Dec. 1840 "Agness" Peay signed her will in Rockingham Co., N.C., and it was proved Aug. (term) 1847 in the Rockingham Co. court. In the will she mentioned "my Grand daughter Mary [perhaps May] Ellyclett [sic, perhaps Elizabeth but it doesn't look like the other Elizabeth mentioned in this will] Peay daughter of my son Washington," "my Grand daughter Ruth Jane Peay Daughter of my son Washington," "my Grand son John Turne [sic, perhaps Turner?] Peay son of said Washington," "my Grand daughter Mary Elizabeth Wall daughter of my son Claborn Wall Dec<sup>d</sup>," "my Daughter Ellenor Wright until said Mary Elizabeth arrives at twenty one years of age," "my Daughter Ellenor Wright," "my son George Washington Peay." Witnesses were J. M. Morehead and James T. M. Wright.<sup>[492]</sup>

On 5 May 1848 a petition was submitted to the court of equity of Rockingham Co., N.C. by James Wright and his wife Ellenor (formerly Ellenor or Eleanor Wall, sister of Claibourn Wall), and by Mary Wall, under 21 [implies born after 1827], by her guardian William R. Walker. Ellenor and Claibourn had been tenants in common on two acres of land lying in Wentworth, formerly occupied by Agness Peays [*sic*], and also on 50 acres about a mile from Wentworth. Claibourn Wall died intestate "some years since leaving your petitioner, Mary Wall, [an?] only child and heir at law." The petitioners seek to sell the land and divide the money, since there is no easy way to partition it. During the proceedings, which extended into 1850, James Wright became the guardian of Mary Wall.<sup>[493]</sup> We deduce from these documents that Eleanor/Elly and Claiborne were two children of Agnes (Sanders) Wall and that Claiborne (Jr.) was born about 1802 or 1803. And that he died leaving a daughter Mary, a minor.

ROBERT<sup>2</sup> SANDERS [SAUNDERS] (<sub>1</sub>*James*<sup>1</sup>) was born 7 Sept. 17[80?] (Family Bible).<sup>[494]</sup> He married (bonded) 28 Feb. 1809, Rocking-ham Co., N.C.,<sup>[495]</sup> ELIZABETH ["BETSY"] ROACH, who was born 1780–1790 (1840 census). William Saunders was bondsman for the marriage.

In 1790 Robert Sanders resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with four males over 16 [born before 1774], one under 16, three females, and no slaves.<sup>[496]</sup> The dates don't fit the Robert of the Family Bible.

In 1800 Robert Sanders, 26–45 [born 1755–1774], resided in Salisbury, Rockingham Co., N.C., with a woman 26–45, and three boys and two girls under 10.<sup>[497]</sup> The dates don't fit the Robert of the Family Bible.

Repeated for convenience: In 1800 James Sanders resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with two girls under 10, one male [fits Robert] and one female 10-16 [born 1784-1790], one male and one female 16-26, and one male and one female over 45, and no slaves.<sup>[498]</sup>

In 1800 James Roach, 26–45, resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with a woman 26–45, two boys and two girls under 10, two females 10–16 [born 1784–1790, fits Betsy Roach], and three males 16–26.<sup>[499]</sup> So James Roach, the only Roach in the county in 1800, was probably the father of Betsy Roach.

In 1820 Robert Saunders, 26–45 [born 1775–1794], resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with a woman 26–45, one boy and three girls under 10, one boy and one girl 10–16.<sup>[500]</sup> This one fits.

Placeholder: In 1830 Robert Sanders, 20–30 [born 1800–1810], resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with a man and a woman 20–30, and one boy under 5.<sup>[501]</sup> A son of the current Robert?

Possible: In 1840 Elizabeth Saunders, 50–60 [born 1780–1790], resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with one male 10–15, one female 15–20, and two females 20–30.<sup>[502]</sup> This appears to fit.

Placeholder: In 1840 "Robt" Saunders, 30–40 [born 1800–1810], resided in Rockingham Co., N.C., with a woman 30–40, two boys and two girls under 5, one boy 5–10, one male 10–15, and one female 15–20.<sup>[503]</sup> A son of the current Robert?

WILLIAM THOMAS ["BILLY JAYBIRD"]**<sup>2</sup> **SANDERS [SAUN-DERS]** (<sub>1</sub>*James*<sup>1</sup>) was born 15 July 1783,<sup>[504]</sup> died Nov. 1874, and was buried in the Sanders family cemetery (on the William Thomas Sanders farm), Giles Co., Tenn.<sup>[505]</sup> He married 26 Mar. 1806 (bonded and li-

censed), Rockingham Co. N.C.,<sup>[506]</sup> ELIZABETH ["BETSY"] C.<sup>2</sup> BEL-LENFANT (<sub>1</sub>*Jean*<sup>1</sup>), who was born 29 Mar. 1787 (gravestone), Virginia (or North Carolina), died 30 Dec. 1870, and was buried near her husband.<sup>[507]</sup>

On 28 Feb. 1809, Rockingham Co., N.C., William Sanders served as a bondsman for his brother Robert's marriage.<sup>[508]</sup>

On 21 May 1810 William Sanders, James Sanders, and Robert Sanders, all of Rockingham Co., N.C., sold 100 acres in Rockingham Co., N.C., to Thomas Lytle of Rockingham Co., for \$200, the land "being on both sides of the Bould Run Creek and on the East side of big Rock house creek." The plot description mentions neighbor John Mount. Witnesses: A. Philips and Robert Martin.<sup>[509]</sup>

On 14 Aug. 1810 William Sanders and Robert Sanders, all of Rockingham Co., N.C., sold 100 acres in Rockingham Co., N.C., to Thomas Lytle of Rockingham Co., for \$100, the land "being on the waters of Big Rock-house Creek." The plot description mentions neighbors Thomas Lytle, Robert Martin, Robert Sanders, – Haggard, John Mount. Witnesses: A. Philips and Pleasant Philips.<sup>[510]</sup>

In 1830 "W<sup>m</sup>" Sanders, 40–50, resided in Williamson Co., Tenn., with a woman 30–40, and with one boy [William Marion] and one girl under 5, two boys and one girl 5–10, and one female 10–15.<sup>[511]</sup> [James, born 1816, doesn't fit.]

In 1840 "W<sup>m</sup>" Sanders, 50–60, resided in Giles Co., Tenn., with a woman 40–50, and with one boy [William Marion] and one girl under 10–15, one boy and one girl 15–20, and one male 20–30.<sup>[512]</sup> [Now James, born 1816, does fit.] Listed next to him was L. D. Sanders, and several names removed was Early Bolin.

In 1850 William Saunders, 68, a farmer born in North Carolina with \$350 real estate, resided in Giles Co., Tenn., with Elizabeth, 65, born in Virginia, and with William, 21, born in Tenn., and with a black family consisting apparently of a mother and four children.<sup>[513]</sup> He had two slaves listed in the 1850 slave schedule, next to one slave for Lorenzo D. Saunders and two for Reason C. Saunders.<sup>[514]</sup>

According to Linda C. Vernon, a descendant and correspondent with my parents, in a letter of 1990: "[Lorenzo Dow Sanders] deeded property 31 Dec. 1859 to his 'parents William Sanders and Elizabeth Sanders' for use during their life. (Giles Co., Tn. Deed Book AA p. 255)."<sup>[515]</sup> See Lorenzo's sketch for details of this transaction.

In 1860 "W<sup>m</sup>" Saunders, 77, a farmer born in North Carolina with 1,100 real and 1,000 personal estates, resided in Lynnville, Giles Co., Tenn., with Elizabeth, 74, born in North Carolina, and with James C., 40, a tradesman born in Tenn.<sup>[516]</sup>

In 1870 William Sanders, 87, a farmer born in North Carolina with \$1,000 real and \$1,562 personal estates, resided in Buford's Station, Giles Co., Tenn., with Elizabeth, 80, born in Virginia.<sup>[517]</sup>

Biography of James C. Sanders from an 1886 history of Tennessee:

Hon. James C. Sanders, a native of Tennessee, was born in 1816, and is the fourth of eight children born to William and Elizabeth (Bellantfant [sic]) Sanders. The parents are natives of North Carolina, and immigrated to Tennessee about 1812, locating in Williamson County, where they remained a few years, after which they permanently settled in Giles County. Here the mother died in 1872, and the father too passed from life about four years later. Our subject passed his early life on the farm and in the district schools. He lived with his father having entire control of the farm until about forty years of age. He was bitterly opposed to secession and stood firm for the Union. During the war he remained at home as quiet and peaceable as man could be under like circumstances. In 1865 he married Catharine Parsons, a native of Tennessee, born about 1830, and the daughter of James W. and Massie (Gordon) Parsons. Our subject began life a poor man, had but poor advantages for an education and yet he is a good neighbor and an energetic, industrious

citizen. In 1860 he was elected to the State Legislature to represent the counties of Marshall, Lincoln and Giles. At the end of two years he returned home and confined himself to the farm until 1884, when he was again called upon to appear before the people as an independent candidate for representative, and was duly elected for the years 1885 and 1886. Mr. Sanders resides in the Twelfth District, on an excellent farm of about 500 acres, which is fairly improved.<sup>[603]</sup>

#### Obituary for James C. Sanders:

Hon. James C. Sanders, of Ocellus, died Monday, Jan. 13, at 7:10 p.m.. Aged 85 years, 2 months, and 20 days.

On Saturday before first Monday, Mr. Sanders attempted to break a stick of wood by striking on end on the ground, but the stick was stronger than he thought, and his right hand severely bruised in the palm and his right arm severely jarred. Mr. Sanders thought nothing of the occurrence and wrapped his bruised hand in a cloth.

He came to town first Monday and appeared before the County Court to ask for a continuance of an appropriation for the relief of William Bowen and wife, an old couple in whom he took interest and secured the appropriation.

He took the cloth off his hand in a day or two and it is thought caught cold in the bruised hand resulting in blood poisoning.

Rev. B. H. Johnson conducted funeral services, and the burial was in the J. E. Abernathy graveyard Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Sanders was a member of the Legislature in 1860–72, and again in 1885. He was born in Williamson County in 1816, and removed to Giles County with his parents in 1819. He leaves considerable property and his life has been full of deeds of charity and kindness.

He is survived by his wife, and was an uncle of R. J. Sanders, Jr. of Riversburg, Mrs. James Hart, Mrs. Wiley T. Abernathy and Amos Sanders.

The Citizen extends condolence to the bereaved families.<sup>[604]</sup>

His father was a gold miner in that region. William M. Sanders, his father, was born in the United States, became a British citizen in Australia, and subsequently resumed his American citizenship rights by naturalization. A native of Tennessee, he left there at the age of eighteen,<sup>[611]</sup> and for a time was a plantation overseer at Bastrop, Texas. After the discovery of gold in California he started west, crossing old Mexico to Matzatlan in Lower California, where he took a vessel for San Francisco. He did most of his prospecting as a placer miner in the vicinity of Stockton, California. Some of his companions there were Hogan, Cassidy and Burdette, and after some months in California they all started for Australia. William M. Sanders worked in the Australian mines for several years, and then engaged in farming and ranching. He married in Australia Miss Sarah Hargraves [*sic*], who was —born near the City of London, and accompanied her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hargraves, to Australia, where the family became farmers and ranchers, and her parents lived out their lives near Tumut.

When Jefferson J. Sanders was still a small child his parents left Australia, embarking on the ship British Commodore, under command of Captain Rands, and after a voyage of fourteen weeks crossed the Pacific to San Francisco. From San Francisco they went east to Denver, then a mere village, and from there to Tennessee, the native state of William M. Sanders. His wife and children remained two years in Giles County while he went to Texas, settling in Menard County, where his family joined him later. They all remained in Menard County until 1892, when they came into New Mexico, settling in Otero County. William M. Sanders after that lived retired until his death in 1896 at the age of seventy years. His wife died the previous year, at the age of sixty-five. She was a member of the Episcopal Church. Their children were: Elizabeth, who died at Albuquerque, New Mexico, in 1887, the wife of William Bruce; Alice, who married John Williamson in Giles County, Tennessee, and died at Roswell, New Mexico, in 1891; William, who died in Menard County at the age of twenty-four; and Jefferson J.<sup>[612]</sup>
